School Wide Positive Behaviour Support

Paynesville Primary School is committed to the implementation of a whole school approach to Positive Behaviour support to maximise individual engagement and learning in both academic and social growth.

What is School-Wide Positive Behaviour Support?

School-wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) is an evidence-based framework for preventing and responding to student behaviour. It aims to create a positive school climate, a culture of student self-regulation and an open, responsive management system for all school community members.

It includes analysis of behaviour and responsive data, and implementation of evidence based instructional and corrective practices. SWPBS provides organisational systems for establishing safe, purposeful and inclusive school and classroom learning environments while providing the individual behaviour and learning supports needed to achieve academic and social success for all students.

Attention is focused on creating and sustaining Tier 1 supports (universal), Tier 2 supports (targeted group), and Tier 3 supports (individual) systems of support to improve student health and wellbeing at school and at home; by making targeted behaviours less effective, efficient, and relevant, and desired behaviour more functional. The purpose of School Wide Positive Behaviours is to establish a school community climate in which appropriate behaviour is the norm.

Our approach aligns academic and behavioural systems to create an emphasis on explicitly teaching, monitoring, acknowledging and rewarding appropriate behaviour. The school Wide Positive Behaviours Support program is underpinned by the school's values of Respect, Safety, Positivity and Learning. At Paynesville Primary School, our values are reflected in our everyday learning and displayed and taught explicitly in all areas of the school. A Behaviour matrix has been developed (see below) in collaboration with staff students, and the school community showing behaviours which are expected at Paynesville Primary School.

These will relate to our values, in all parts of the school and in all school related activities. All students are to be explicitly taught the values and expected behaviours. The behaviours will be consistently monitored by all staff and the relevant behaviours are expected from every staff member.

In the 4/5 classroom we have undertaken some amazing learning.


In Reading we have been practising the reading strategies that we have been looking at over the term.


to the kindergartens still and are really enjoying planning games and activities to share with the little ones!

The Grade 6 classroom continues to be a busy place and many students are started to look forward to the different activities happening next term. Students have enjoyed working on their predicting and inferring skills in reading. They have also enjoyed the mentor texts that we have used to practise these skills.

Students learnt how to structure a newspaper article but also how to manage their time as they were given a specific deadline.

We have continued to work on our measurement skills in numeracy. Students have learnt about our measurement system and how to

National Threatened Species Day is commemorated across Australia on September 7th to raise awareness of plants and animals at risk of extinction. This day is commemorated annually on the anniversary of the death in captivity of the last known thylacine, or Tasmanian Tiger. Australia has one of the highest mammal extinction rates in the world. Over the last 200 years, more than 100 animal and plant species have become extinct in this country.

In East Gippsland Shire alone there are

- 70 species of threatened birds
- · 29 species of threatened mammals
- 16 species of threatened fish.
- · 12 species of threatened reptiles
- · 8 species of threatened amphibians
- 17 species of threatened invertebrates
