Hi everyone,

Over the course of last week many parents attended Parent Teacher Interviews with the teachers. Teachers worked hard to ensure they were able to discuss the plans for supporting the students academic and social emotional needs. Thanks to the teachers and parents that attended for privileging the time for these important meetings to take place.

NAPLAN 2025: Families were sent home information about these tests last week and students in grades 3 and 5 have been working in classes and as part of the Tutor Learning Program to familiarise themselves with the test formats and processes so they reduce the feeling of anxiety that can sometimes present itself when the word 'test' is verbalised. Dates: Testing period commences on Wednesday 12th March and runs through until Monday 24th March to ensure time is available for students who miss tests on particular days early in the testing window have the ability to undertake these in Catch Up test days.

Yesterday a group of our grade 5/6 students commenced their training in Lawn Bowls at the Paynesville Bowling Club. They had a great start and coaching was undertaken by John, Rhonda and Ivan from the club. They will continue this training on a Tuesday afternoon until the Division Bowls competition in Bairnsdale on Wednesday 26th March.









Next week we have our 4 yearly school review. The School Review Team commence here on Monday. This will be a Validation Day and Wednesday and Thursday will be Field Days. The reviewers have a Parent Forum set up for 9am on Wednesday where they like to get input from parents/guardians or family members on their thoughts and opinions about our school. School Saving Bonus

Families are aware that the Vic Government has provided a one-off \$400 payment for children enrolled at Government schools. This \$400 can be used for uniforms and school activities. A lot of our families have already been making use of this bonus.

Camps, Sports & Excursions Funding

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund provides a \$154 payment for eligible students to attend school camps, excursions and applicable sporting programs.

Those that are eligible to apply for the CSEF are:

- families holding a valid means-tested concession card eg: Health care card, pensioner concession card, temporary foster carer or eligible beneficiary of Veterans affairs gold card
- A special consideration category also exists for refugee and asylum seeker families and students placed in temporary care.

Eligible means-tested cards - means-tested concession cards must now be valid on either:

- the first day of Term 1 28 January
- the first day of Term 2 22 April

The full list of eligible concession and health care cards is available on the <u>Services Australia</u> website. Cards that are not financially means tested are not accepted.





Grade 3/4 Classroom Report



We've been at school for four weeks now, and there's been plenty of learning happening! In Reading, we've focused on text-to-text and text-to-self connections while exploring books from the library. Everyone is becoming more confident in making connections that help deepen their understanding of the texts they read.



In Maths, we've been extending our number knowledge by working with large number addition, inverse operations, and odd and even numbers. Students have been using different strategies to solve problems and explain their thinking to the class.

A highlight of the term so far was our Hockey incursion, which everyone really enjoyed! It was a great opportunity to learn new skills, work as a team, and have lots of fun.

We've also been taking part in swimming lessons, building confidence and developing important water safety skills. It's been fantastic to see students challenging themselves and making great progress in the pool.



It's been a fantastic start to the year, and the class is already working hard to earn counters for the chance to choose a prize from the prize box. Their enthusiasm and dedication to learning have been wonderful to see, and I have no doubt they'll be excited to claim their rewards soon!

Grade 4/5 Classroom Report

The 4/5 classroom has hit the ground running this term! Week 4 has seen us start our Reading Groups and really find our feet as a class! The kids all split into their reading groups half way through our reading sessions and work together on the same books. I can't wait to see the progression of comprehension across the room!



We have been working on our /a/ and /k/c/q/ck/x/ch/ sounds in spelling and the kids are really enjoying sharing their answers and interacting on the floor during the mini lessons.



During maths we have been looking at Multiplication, factors, multiples & will be looking at Division in the coming week!

In reading we have begun looking at our reading response strategies which will help with comprehension. We have been predicting what will happen based on just the front cover and blurb. We are then asking questions as we read and giving an opinion when we finish. This can be an opinion on not just the book but the way it's written, the illustrations, the choices the characters make or even the







The kids have been writing pieces with partners and of their own choosing - however, we will be doing some more practice with persuasive and narrative NAPLAN style pieces to ready the Grade 5s for the main event.

In Humanities/Geography we have been learning about the Earth. The kids have been making labelled maps with the continents, equator, oceans/seas and different climates. We will be making dioramas in the coming week showcasing different continents!

I'm amazed as always at how awesome this group is!

Grade 5/6 Classroom Report

Students have continued on their good start that they made at the start of the year. In reading, students have worked on their reading responses and continued to work on their understanding of their and the adult's roles during our lessons.

In writing, students have worked on developing their narrative skills. The main skills we have worked on are showing rather than telling and hooking the reader in. They have created interesting stories and it is great to see so many students excited about writing.

In maths, students have completed a unit on place value. Assessment results show some fantastic growth and it is great to see students becoming more confident in their understanding. We are currently working on a range of mental strategies when adding or subtracting.

Our students enjoyed the recent hockey clinic and improved in their skills and understanding of the game.



STEM

S.T.E.M (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) has been an exciting new addition to our school this year. Students across all year levels have been exploring different forces that cause motion, discovering how push, pull, friction, and gravity impact movement in our world.

Our Grade 4-6 students have an exciting challenge ahead as they work towards designing and building their very own go-karts! This project will put their problem-solving and engineering skills to the test as they apply their knowledge of forces in a hands-on way.

To help bring this project to life, we are on the lookout for spare wheels that are bigger than a shopping trolley wheel but smaller than a bike wheel. If you have any to donate, please bring them in—we'd greatly appreciate the support!

It's been fantastic to see students so engaged in their learning, and we can't wait to see their creativity and teamwork shine in this project.



Food Technology

This week we have continued exploring the theme:



This week we made Sweet Potato Samosas with Mango dipping Sauce as we explored ORANGE Foods. Recipe Below!

Sweet Potato & Carrot filling

- 1 cup grated sweet potatoes
- 1 cup grated carrot
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- ½ cup (130 grams) fresh or frozen peas, defrosted
- ½ onion finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, grated
- ½ teaspoon fresh ginger, grated
- 1 teaspoon cumin seeds
- ½ teaspoon ground coriander
- ¼ teaspoon garam masala
- ½ teaspoon salt

Gently fry onion, garlic, ginger in oil.

Add cumin, coriander, garam masala and salt. Cook until soft and fragrant.

Add grated vegetables and peas with a dash of water.

Put on a lid and cook until soft. Allow to cool.

Dough

- · 2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for kneading
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2/3 cup Warm water

Sift flour, baking powder and salt.

Drizzle with oil and water

Mix with a fork, then with your hands.

Knead until smooth, cover and rest.

Roll into balls, roll out into discs, cut in half and create a cone. Add filling to each one, pinch to close and shallow fry until golden! YUM!!


